



Special Provisions (as set by states and universities)

Alabama

- **Auburn University** limits ACM access to undergraduate programs. Only 25 new ACM participants are accepted each year; and students must be at the junior or senior level to participate in the ACM. Auburn selects applicants on a competitive basis. The deadline is March 15. Applicants should first contact the institutional coordinator's office prior to contacting state coordinator.
- The **University of Alabama** limits ACM access to the programs that are currently listed in the ACM inventory and applies the following two new conditions for participating in approved ACM programs:
 - (1) For first-time ACM certification, an undergraduate student must have at least a 25 ACT composite score or 1130 SAT composite score (math and verbal only) and at least a 3.00 overall high school GPA.
 - (2) For continuing certification after the first semester of ACM support, each UA ACM student must maintain at least a 3.00 overall GPA on all UA course work attempted. This GPA standard is in addition to the long-standing requirements for maintaining residency and major.

Delaware

- The **University of Delaware** limits ACM access to the programs that are currently listed in the ACM inventory.

Florida

- The **state of Florida** limits ACM access to graduate programs only.

Georgia

- The **Georgia Institute of Technology** limits ACM access to programs that are currently listed in the ACM inventory and is planning to limit its participation in the ACM to the graduate level beginning summer semester 2011. The last semester they will take students through the ACM into their undergraduate programs is spring semester 2011.
- **Georgia State University** limits ACM access to graduate programs only.
- The **University of Georgia** grants ACM access after students have completed at least 60 college credit hours and been formally admitted into the ACM degree program. ACM eligibility at UGA is limited to four academic semesters for undergraduate students.

Maryland

- The **University of Maryland, Eastern Shore** does not participate in the ACM.

Mississippi

- **Mississippi State University** limits ACM access to the programs that are currently listed in the ACM inventory.
- The **state of Mississippi** limits the eligibility of Mississippi residents participating in the ACM program to those enrolled in degree programs on a full-time basis. Full-time enrollment status will be based on the host institution's definition of full-time enrollment.
- The **University of Mississippi** limits ACM access to the programs that are currently listed in the ACM inventory.
- The **University of Southern Mississippi** limits ACM access to the programs that are currently listed in the ACM inventory.

North Carolina

- **Important Notice:** As a result of the General Assembly of North Carolina's Appropriations Act of 2011, North Carolina's participation in the ACM, as both a sender and a receiver of students, will be phased out beginning with academic year 2012-13. Students certified for the ACM who are enrolled and begin study prior to the second summer session in 2012 may continue to pay in-state tuition as long as they remain enrolled in their specified degree program. (The second summer session is considered to be a part of the following academic year, even if it should begin prior to July 1.)

In addition, North Carolina will no longer accept requests for the addition of new degree programs to the ACM inventory, effective November 1, 2011.

- The **state of North Carolina** participates in the ACM at the graduate level only and requires incoming ACM participants to maintain full-time enrollment at the UNC campuses for which they are certified, as defined by each individual institution.
 - North Carolina limits access to its residential degree programs only; that is, North Carolina is unable to offer its online degree programs through the ACM.
 - North Carolina degree programs must be “not commonly available” in order to be eligible for the ACM inventory.

Oklahoma

- The **University of Oklahoma** limits ACM access to the programs that are currently listed in the ACM inventory.

South Carolina

- The **state of South Carolina** limits the eligibility of South Carolina residents participating in the ACM program to those enrolled in degree programs on a full-time basis. Full-time enrollment status will be based on the host institution's definition of full-time enrollment.
- **The Citadel** does not participate in the ACM.
- **College of Charleston** does not participate in the ACM.
- **Francis Marion University** does not participate in the ACM.
- **University of South Carolina-Beaufort** does not participate in the ACM.
- **Clemson University** limits ACM access to graduate programs only.
- **Coastal Carolina University** will not add the BSBA in Marketing (Professional Golf Management) to the ACM.

Texas

- The **state of Texas** limits ACM access to residential graduate programs only.
- The **University of Texas at Austin** does not participate in the ACM.

Virginia

- The **College of William and Mary** limits ACM access to programs that are currently listed in the ACM inventory.
- **George Mason University** has restrictive policies for ACM students including full-time status; continuous enrollment; eligibility limited to official time limit for degree; and prohibition against pursuing additional degree components beyond the approved ACM program. Check the Mason Registrar's web site for detailed information.
- **James Madison University** does not participate in the ACM.
- **Mary Washington College** does not participate in the ACM.
- **University of Virginia** does not participate in the ACM.
- **Virginia Commonwealth University** does not participate in the ACM.
- **Virginia Military Institute** does not participate in the ACM.
- Students studying at **Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University** may enroll in the engineering programs with ACM benefit only after the general courses in engineering have been completed.

West Virginia

- **West Virginia University** will not add the BS in Forensic and Investigative Science to the ACM during the 2010-2011 and 2011-2012 academic years.
- Students studying at the **West Virginia University Institute of Technology** must have completed the associate's degree in Printing Technology before enrolling in the bachelor's degree in Printing Management through the ACM.
