



EQUAL:

Families and educators recognize that both bring valuable knowledge to the table. Their deep knowledge and skills are complementary, overlapping and essential to ensuring children's success.

EQUITABLE:

Families are empowered to work with educators, public officials and community partners to remove systemic, structural and organizational barriers that perpetuate inequities and injustice.

Post-Secondary Readiness

- Post-secondary readiness is the attainment of the necessary knowledge, skills, and disposition for a student to successfully transition to the next level of his or her career.
- To demonstrate Post-secondary readiness, students must earn a diploma/alternative diploma, or be classified as a grade 12 non-graduate AND meet one type of readiness (Academic or Career).




Building Equitable Pathways

Measuring Impact



Purpose

Roots to Readiness is a culturally responsive, year-long initiative designed to strengthen postsecondary readiness by meaningfully engaging Black and Brown families. Through advocacy training, college exposure, financial literacy, and intergenerational learning, the program builds trust between schools and families while advancing student success.

Key Components

- September 2025-May 2026
- College Visit to a state college/university
- Relationship Building through opportunities for storytelling
- Financial Literacy Workshops with Commonwealth Credit Union
- Family Advocacy & Postsecondary Planning Sessions
- "The Family Reunion" year-end celebration and certificate ceremony



Connections to 2025 FCPS Family Engagement

Survey: What did families say?



- Response Count: 14,087; Total Households: 25,909
- Survey was translated into Arabic, French, Japanese, Kinyarwanda, Nepali, Spanish, and Swahili
- Survey looked at three primary areas: overall perception of family engagement, communication methods, and culture and climate; data indicated general positive feedback in all areas
- Lower satisfaction among Black/African American families and those receiving special education services with lower levels of agreement regarding the usefulness of communication methods and the inclusiveness of school culture and climate
- The Hispanic/Latino family Net Promoter Score and those who receive English Learner Services were higher than other demographics



Creating with Family Voice in Mind



Families Strengths: At a recent community event, we had the opportunity for families to share their strengths by answering the following question:

What are you most proud of in your family? What helps your family stay strong, connected, or keep pushing forward—even when it's hard?

Families' Challenges: What makes it hard to show up?

- Scheduling considerations: conflicts (work/family obligations), time consuming, unexpected changes
- Start Times: Sometimes the programs start late in the evening
- Transportation**
- Getting Friends to Join
- Stress



Creating with Family Voice in Mind



What would make a program feel right for your family?


- More communication

Defining Your Vision and Alignment

- Audit Question: Are our family engagement efforts aligned with broader CCR goals?
- Ensure family engagement supports broader school, district, and organizational goals, such as improving student achievement through rigorous curriculum.
- Explore methods for empowering families to actively engage in their children's postsecondary education, fostering agency.



Assessing Your Engagement Model

- Use models like the Dual Capacity-Building Framework to structure partnership efforts.
- Conduct a "Pulse Check": After family activities, verify if families leave knowing their child's learning goals and how (through practice) to employ a new tool at home, and have the opportunity to share knowledge about their child with educators.
